


EHS MEMBERSHIP

Civil War Veteran **MELVIN SYLVESTER JELLISON**

Melvin Jellison Ceremony -November 11, 2019

November 4, 1846 - September 10, 1947

The Civil War might have seemed like miles away to many who lived in the Pine Tree State, but Maine had their own contributors ready to travel far from home and serve as soldiers trying to unite their country. One of those young men was Melvin Sylvester Jellison.

Melvin was born in 1846 and grew up with his brothers and sisters on the family farm and was educated in a one-room school house. He spent 100 years and 10 months in his small community, but things changed for three years. Melvin's care free days ended when he and his father, John, decided to enlist in the Union Army. They were in different regiments. The date of Melvin's enlistment was August 1, 1862, as a Private, Co. B, 6th Maine Regiment Infantry in Bangor, Maine.

Melvin saw more action than his father. He fought in the Battle of Antietam (Sept. 17, 1862), just months after his enlistment. He went on to fight in the Battle of Mayes Heights, Fredericksburg,



and Salem Church (1863). In June of 1863 he was at the Battle of Brandy Station; July of 1863, found him in Gettysburg with the Howes Brigade; in the same month at Big Round Top; and in 1864 at the Battle of the Wilderness. He made it to Spotsylvania Court House and in June was at the Battle of Cold Harbor, Va. In July of 1864 he was sent to muster out and then volunteered 30 days for the defense of Washington.

One of Melvin's favorite stories was when he was at Washington Military Hospital as a guard. "One day while on duty a plain looking man with a tall stove pipe hat rode up and walked to the entrance. Melvin asked him to give the 'countersign.' However, the man did not know the countersign but said he was the President of the United States. Melvin had never seen President Lincoln so he did not know if he should believe him. The Sargent of the Guard was called to identify President Lincoln. Melvin started to apologize, but Lincoln gave him a pat on the back, shook his hand, and said, "Don't apologize, my boy. It's all right. You only did your duty." Melvin saw President Lincoln several more times and Lincoln always gave a nod and a smile.

Returning home from the war, Melvin married Broocksy DeBeck and they raised four children. For over 60 years he attracted attention when he drove his four or six horse team to Bangor on errands or to stock up. Horses were one of his greatest pleasures. Melvin was a farmer raising his own provisions. At only 4 years of age, he drove an ox team (he held the goad stick because the oxen knew the way to go.) He was a teamster hauling cedar shingles, birch logs, and anything that needed to be taken Bangor way. He was also a Road Commissioner around 1905 and built the first state aid road in this area. He loved to fish for brook trout and had some favorite holes on his own back lot. During the 1920's and 30's he would work at the Bangor Fair around the horses he loved, and there he made many friends.

In his 90's Melvin went to Bangor to be in the Armistice and Memorial Day parades. In 1945, Melvin was the last GAR (Grand Army of the Republic) Civil War survivor from Eastern and Northern Maine. For several years he was the lone member of the B.H. Beal Post 12 in Bangor.

November 11, 2019, The Last Soldier Ceremony for Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War was held for Melvin Sylvester Jellison to honor and forever mark the resting place of the last Civil War soldier of Penobscot County, Maine.

RECIPE

From Maine Cookbook, 1924

Great Grandmother's Molasses Cake

1/2 C. sugar 1 c. molasses ¹/₂ c. lard (melted) 1 tsp. rounded baking soda 1 tsp. cloves 1/2 tsp. ginger 3 c. flour ½ tsp. salt

Add salt, soda, spices and sugar to flour. Sift into bowl. Add molasses. Mix well then add 1 cup boiling water. Beat.

Bake 350°F 30-35 minutes. Enjoy!
